A message from our Board Chair and Executive Director

Lansdowne Children’s Centre’s dedication to the potential of local infants, children and youth begins with family-centered services, and the collaborative approach working together with families and community partners.

To achieve our strategic goals, this past year has included focus on team development, strengthening a culture of excellence with communication and understanding, and reinforcing leadership engagement across managers, union partners, and employees.

Modernized Human Resource practices and improved access to digital systems have resulted in more streamlined workflows and an improved employee experience. Our 250+ employees working in 16 clinical and functional program disciplines have supported over 6,900 local families across the Grand Erie region, delivering services across more than 4,000 square kilometres to meet children and families where they live.

The work is challenging but rewarding, and team members report feeling valued, supported, and empowered to do their best work. Employment and service volume milestones were countered with an exciting step forward in our organization’s future. This past year delivered the announcement of the construction site in Brantford-Brant where the next generation of Lansdowne kids and families will seek service and support.

Our capital project is moving forward. We embarked on zoning changes and procurement of architectural design support, all with the valued partnership and support of our Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services funder.

In a strategic effort to be positioned for success, we dissolved our Foundation after twenty years, creating a unified focus as we advance toward a major capital fundraising campaign. We are deeply grateful for the contributions of former board members and past employees who together grew our fundraising program to its current strength.

The transition created an integrated Department of Development and Community Relations, embedded within the organization’s core functions. Community gifts to Lansdowne will continue to support our greatest needs, including programs and services like *Every Kid Counts*, Equipment Loans, and Family Engagement events. This position also strengthens our ability to achieve the strategic priority of ‘telling our story’ to key internal and external audiences, nurturing an understanding of needs and supports.

Looking ahead, we are mindful that many more infants, children, youth, and families seek to benefit from Lansdowne services. Our innovative spirit seeks to improve our capacity to better manage long wait times. We have served 10% more unique individuals compared to the previous year – that’s **40% more than reported in 2021-2022.**

We are pursuing every opportunity to reach our donors, partners, and community, to share the reality of demand for Lansdowne services, seeking support to help even more kids and families.

One of our greatest challenges is growing our roster of pediatric specialists. Many groups are competing for the same few people, and demand is simply outpacing the growth of the workforce. Ministry leaders, funders, and schools need to work together to fix this. Through *Empowered Kids Ontario*, we are part of a team working to provide education, advocacy and hope for changes that will make care better and help more kids.



Working together, we can reach more families where they are, and deliver the support needed to help infants, children and youth discover their potential, unlock new skills and new smiles.

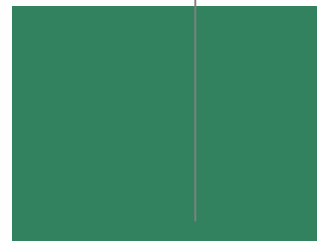
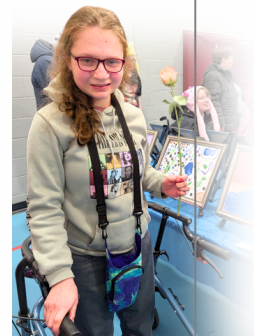

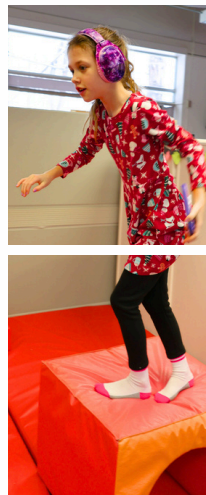
Power of Community

Community engagement plays a vital role in expanding awareness of Lansdowne Children’s Centre and the wide range of child development services available to our region’s families.

Community Collaboration, Building Connections



Lansdowne partnered with Haldimand-Norfolk REACH to host collaborative networking events to introduce team members and encourage cross-team conversation and sharing of best practices and client and family strategies.

Community collaborations providing education and experiences for Lansdowne child and youth clients and their families included work with **Autism Dog Services, Brantford Police, Brantford Fire, Chickadee Music, Devlin's Country Bistro, the Mobile Cancer Screening Coach, Sharp Bus Lines, Therapeutic Paws of Canada, a school resource officer, and Jungle Jamz reptile show.**



Through a partnership with **Mission Thrift Store** in Brantford, the participants in the new Lansdowne Children's Centre **Venture into Volunteering** Therapeutic Recreation program have been experiencing greater connection to their community.

Each program promotes inclusion and socialization, inviting participants into a comfortable situation with their peers who share similar interests. 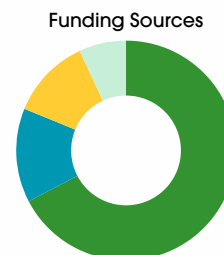

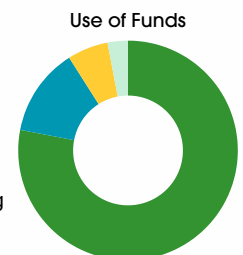

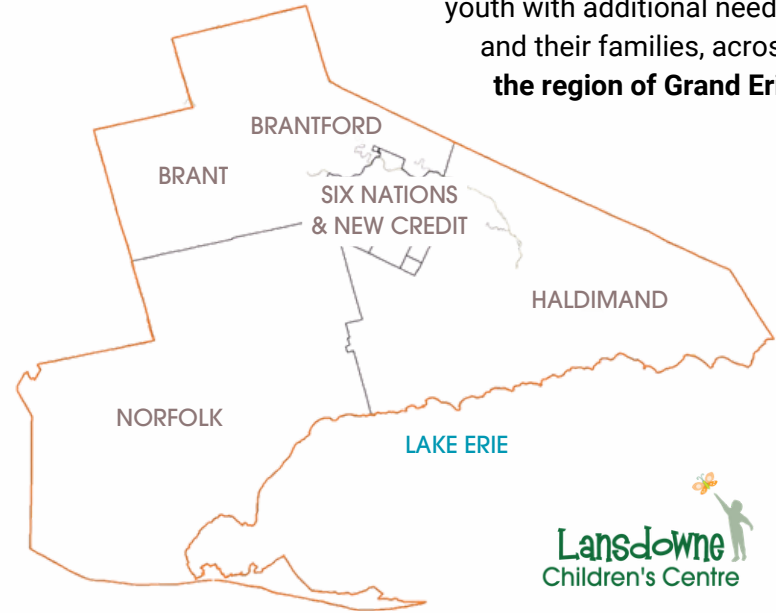

Lansdowne acknowledges we are on the traditional treaty and unceded territory of the Original People including the

Attawanderon, Anishnaabe, and Haudenosaunee that has long been home to the Six Nations of the Grand River and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation.
